A Butterfly's Tail

This is about one butterfly and two photographs. It is also about how we associate butterflies with the resurrection of Christ because they too go through a "death" in the cocoon where they are transformed from a not-so-pretty caterpillar to a gorgeous butterfly. I always pictured the beautiful butterfly as a symbol of Christ. It just recently occurred to me that the transformed butterfly can represent US. It can be WE who are transformed and made beautiful through Christ's death and resurrection. Christ has born the ugliness of our sin.

Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted (Isaiah 53:4).

So, here is where the pictures come in. The one on the left, in profile, shows what appears to be a perfect butterfly. However, in the picture on the right, showing both of the butterfly's wings, we see it is less than perfect. Something happened to the right wing of that butterfly! That is what made me see US as the butterfly. WE are definitely not perfect! But we are FORGIVEN. So, is this butterfly any less beautiful? I don't think so. And we are no less beautiful in God's eyes. We are His children, forgiven and beautiful.

We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. (Romans 6:4)





Even in its imperfection, this butterfly carried on, doing what butterflies do. Isn't that how we should behave as well? We sometimes use our imperfections as excuses for not heeding God's will for us. We might see ourselves as the butterfly in the second picture, but God sees us as the one in the first picture. He loves us despite our weakness, frailty, and imperfection. And HE can accomplish HIS will, through us, despite our imperfections.

But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me. For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses, insults, hardships, persecutions, and calamities. For when I am weak, then I am strong (2 Corinthians 12:9-10).

So, through our baptism and the leading of the Holy Spirit, we are brought to new life in Christ. And best of all because of God's infinite grace and mercy, our sins are forgiven and forgotten. What a blessed, precious gift! I pray that every day you remember this gift and that you realize just how beautiful you are.

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who by God's power are being guarded through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time (1 Peter 1:3-5).

Christ IS risen! Alleluia!

Life apart leading to life together

As I am sitting in the basement of our house, in the middle of my wife's craft room, I find myself alone and resting in the quietness. I can hear the birds chirping outside, as well as the frogs in the field out back. This noise is subtle enough to drown out the noise of passing cars, the ticking of the clock behind me, and many of the other noises that would distract me from keeping focused on the task at hand. This task at hand that I am working on is a sermon that I plan to share with the church in the weeks ahead. After much time apart and offering only on line service, we began coming back together again the Sunday before Ash Wednesday. After a couple months of staring at empty pews and not able to see their eyes, or share in their smiles that are the result of the joy and happiness they have coming together, I am over thrilled to have people back in the seats for service where they belong. My prayer is that as the weeks go by, we continue to see the numbers of those in our community who have contracted drop considerably, and that we can begin to move back to "normal", although the new normal will not be anything like what the norm once was.

As I am looking ahead to the readings that rest before, I found myself reflecting on the reading from Ephesians 2, which through the years has become more and more powerful for me in my personal life. Yes, I am sure that many of us can quote a portion of the text from memory, because we have leaned into it time and time again, but for me, given all that we have experienced and shared in over the past year, it has taken on a whole new level of meaning and understanding for me. Like I said I am sure that many of us can either quote word for word, verses 8-10 from chapter 2 of Paul's writing to the Ephesians. To help jog your memory, here it is; "For it is by grace you have been saved through faith. And it is not of your own doing; it is the gift from God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them." Yes, these words are encouraging and for us to understand that we are not saved by our works, but instead we are saved by what has been done for us, is awesome.

But, many times we fail to look back at the words or the verses that proceeded the verses we are so familiar with.

For example, let's look back at the opening verses from this chapter; "And you were once dead in your trespasses and sins in which you once walked, following the course of this world, the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work in the sons of disobedience." Quite a stark difference from the verses that fall just a couple of lines later. If we read this alone, we might feel isolated, alone and scared. But Paul does not leave us there to wallow in our filth and sin, instead he reminds us that we are not alone, instead, God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ.

We are made alive... TOGETHER... in Christ. So even in the midst of this pandemic, looking back at the days we spent isolated and alone in our homes, keeping away from any real social interaction... even then we were not alone. We were still together, as one unit, as believers in Christ. So we begin to make the move back, in the months ahead to in person services, studies and visits, rejoice in the fact that you and I were never alone, but instead we have been fused together as believers in and through Jesus, and all that He has done for us. God is good and His steadfast love endures forever and ever. We are never alone... but together we are one.

Vicki Eubanks here, the first Mid-South District Deaf Ministry Liaison and current West TN Zone President.

I have often wondered how I could serve LWML in the future as I am hearing impaired. It is impossible for me to have normal phone conversations with most people. I hear some better than others due to variables like decibels and pronunciation, but it is hard for me at times to decipher what is being said, on the phone and in person. So many of the volunteer positions with LWML require phone calling.

I was so excited when President Candy asked about a volunteer for this position. This I know about and this I can do! My job is to reach out to everyone to see if there are ladies in your congregations that want to be included in your LWML meetings but have not joined due to being deaf or hearing impaired. We want everyone to be included and know that they are loved and welcomed. I am in the process of reaching out to you to see if you have ladies that need to be contacted. I am also trying to gather information about volunteer interpreters in the different areas. I am not an interpreter but I am trying to learn sign language. I encourage each of you to take the time to learn some as well.

One thing that I would like to mention is that it is FUN to take a sign language class and is great work for your brain. There are so many <u>Youtube</u> videos and in person classes available. I encourage you to look on the LWML <u>website</u> and see all the resources that are listed under a deaf ministry search.

Mission Goal vs. Mission Grants Explanation

A recent question was asked relative to the MISSION GOAL (\$130,000) versus the MISSION GRANTS GOAL (\$96,000). The simple answer is that the mission grants goal is just a part of the total mission goal. Of course, that may lead to another question – what's the other \$34,000 for? That question can be answered by looking at the section of the Treasurer's report that contains the Mission Fund budget.

The color coding indicates there are three different elements included in the Mission Fund.


The blue-highlighted items are all directly tied to mite contributions. So, the Mission Goal must cover not only the Mission Grants that we vote to fund but also the additional 25% of mites that we pledge to the national LWML. Furthermore, our mites send our YWRs and other district representatives to the national LWML conventions. These include the Christian Life Committee chairman, the Jr. Pastoral Counselor and the President (partial). The national equalization fee covers the expenses of the LWML representative to our district convention.

The green-highlighted items reference the district retreats held in odd-numbered years. These are expected to break -even so you can see that the income and disbursements are equal. In the event that the disbursements are more than the receipts, the deficit is paid from the mites we collect.

Finally, the yellow-highlighted items are the Quarterly subscriptions. You can see that the disbursements are considerably higher than the receipts. This is because not all groups pay the total amount for their subscriptions. Sadly, that deficit must come out of the mites we collect. The district is working hard to communicate this deficit and ask that all groups pay for the total number of subscriptions they receive.

Another thing you may notice is that the total receipts are less than total disbursements. The Finance Committee deliberately developed a deficit budget because of a surplus in the Mission Fund toward the end of the previous biennium.

I hope everyone is doing well and enjoying the warmer weather.

First I want to thank everyone for their mites. We have been able to pay two grants and a second installment for another since the end of December.

January, 2021 -- Lutheran Heritage Foundation - Witnessing to the Ethiopian: Catechisms and Devotions -- \$4,500.00

February, 2021 -- 2nd Installment -- Financial Aid for Professional Church Workers -- \$3, 750 -- Total Paid \$7,500

March, 2021 -- Concordia Seminary St. Louis International Graduate School Students' Support -- \$6,000

The next grant we will be paying (hopefully in April and May) is The River Ministry -- Women and Children - Replace 6 washers and 6 dryers, service contract to be paid in 2 consecutive installments of \$5,000 a piece. This ministry is located in Johnson City, TN which is part of the East TN LWML Zone.

The Mission Grant Committee has been working to provide fact sheets for each mission grant recipient. On the Mission Grant table you can click on the name of the grant and it will take you to the Fact Sheet. On the Fact Sheet you will find the name of the recipient, the grant amount, a description, the link to the convention video, a link to their website (if they have one), and a link to their Facebook page (if any). We will work to complete the remaining grants within the next month or so.
