What Amazing Insight!

Several years ago I was driving on the freeway on a rainy day. Cruising along about 60 m.p.h. I spotted a dog ahead starting to cross the road. There was a car next to me, and a ditch on the other side. There was no way to avoid hitting the dog.

I did, and it caused extensive damage to my car. I managed to get it to an exit and soon a tow truck happened by (thanks, Lord). The driver agreed to take me 75 miles to the body shop.

On the way, we had a pleasant conversation. At one point I lamented what had happened and how inconvenient it was. What stood out—and what I'll never forget—is the driver's reply:

"What if God caused that dog to run out to prevent something worse happening to you farther up the road?"

What amazing insight! What a simple, yet humbling lesson to remind me about God, His love and His care. While there's no way to know if the driver was correct, there's no way to know that he wasn't. That brings to mind the mysterious ways of God.

How often do we experience things in life and wonder why God would let those things happen? "Why is this happening?" "There can't possibly be a reason for this!"

Especially during difficult times, it's tempting to wonder about God's care and presence instead of trusting Him when He says He cares for us and always is with us. We tend to see little more than what we desire, instead of trusting the Lord that He is leading us through this fallen world to the everlasting kingdom.

"My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, declares the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts" (Isaiah 55:8).


DISTRICT DEAF MINISTRY LIAISON

Time to Think About Mission Grant Requests!

It is not too early to start looking around in your congregation and community for worthy projects that would benefit from mission grant funding. Not sure where to look? Here are some suggestions:

Lutheran Schools – there are 22 Lutheran schools and preschools in the Mid-South District. Whoever heard of a school that had all the resources it needed??? Just think, Lutheran schools are places where not only children hear and learn God's Word, but most likely their parents become more involved as well.

Seminarians and Church Workers – who is going to lead us into the future? Who is going to teach those children in Lutheran Schools? There is a desperate need for scholarships for pastors and church workers.

Life Ministry Organizations – We live in a time when people think it is acceptable to take the lives of unborn babies. Many women see abortion as their only alternative. We need to support Christian organizations that offer other alternatives as well as support for both mother and baby.

Begin by praying that God will guide you to the organizations or ministries in your area that He wants to bless. Then, make a list of potential recipients, do some research on them, and make an appointment to discuss possible projects that could use support. Just remember the key criteria are that the project:

- Fits into the plans and projections of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and the LC-MS District.
- Is mission focused in emphasis, extending the ministry of the Word.
- Is current and ready for implementation.
- Is well documented.

MISSION GRANTS UPDATE

Can you believe that half of the year has already gone by? Hope everyone is doing well.

Since last quarter we paid one grant which we paid in two installments in April and May.

The River Ministry – Women and Children – Replace 6 washers and 6 dryers, service contract - \$10,000

The next mission grants to be paid are as follows:

Faith Lutheran Child Care & Preschool – Flooring for renovated house/Sun shade or sail for playground - \$6,000

Inspiritus - Building Healthy Families - Purchase program supplies, caring closet items, meeting meals - \$5,000

Oasis Women's Ministry - Renovating an area for Bible study - Furniture, cabinets, Bible St prog - \$5,000

We also need to pay the third installment of the grant for "Financial Aid for Professional Church Workers" which will be \$3,750 in October.

The new mission grants at the national level were selected during June, 2021. The 2021-2023 mission goal is \$2,150,000 with 90% of this going toward mission grants. I received the Mission Grant Report for the Concordia Seminary St. Louis International Graduate School Student's Support which was the grant we paid in March. Ben was eighty years old. He was in great shape for his age. Until fifteen years ago he had worked very hard, establishing his own business. The Lord blessed that effort with great value in that business. Upon retirement, it was time for Ben to enjoy more recreation time. He lined up four different groups with whom to golf throughout the week. His wife and he loved to gather with family and friends. In their new busy schedule of retirement, there was little energy left to review their estate plan. Ben had always said that 25% of his assets, except for the house, would be a gift to their congregation. Eventually, Ben agreed to meet with an LCMS Foundation Gift Planning Counselor and discovered that all his financial accounts were directed by beneficiary designations that would give 100% to his wife or 100% to their son. Since the will directed that their house be given to their son, and 100% of their financial accounts would be going to their son, what was left was about \$3,500 in the checking account that would be controlled by the gifting language of their will. This successful businessman was going to give a \$750 gift to his church. That was not what Ben wanted at all! This realization moved him to put down the golf clubs for one day to work on his plans. After items were updated, Ben commented that he was really at peace knowing that their plan was secure and in place. He rejoiced in the gift that would be going to ministry. Are you like Ben and his wife? Is it time for a review of your plans?

Twenty years ago, you put a plan together when your list of assets was much different than it is today. Your investment advisor is different. You do not own the same accounts. You may have rolled over 401ks into an IRA. An insurance policy disappeared; another has changed status. Do you understand the significance of all those changes? Have you properly filled out beneficiary designation change forms? Your LWML Gift Planning Counselor can help connect the dots between current assets and past plans, identifying where there may have been some drift. Mission Possible! East Tennessee Zone Christian Life Workshop

On April 10, 2021, twenty-nine women from nine LWML societies in the East Tennessee Zone gathered at Faith Lutheran Church in Oak Ridge for a time of fellowship, Bible study, singing and service.

We assembled 20 household cleaning kits, and 20 hygiene kits. And, we collected gas/fuel card for the Family Resource Center located within Willow Brook Elementary School in Oak Ridge. Jo Bruce, Director of the Resource Center, gave a passionate presentation explaining the mission of the Family Resource Center and how it works to assist "at risk" children and their families in the prevention and eradication of problems that interfere with their ability to become fully functioning and independent members community. Jo Bruce was overwhelmed with the generosity of the items collected at the in-gathering stating that when families are struggling to make ends meet the additional cost of cleaning and hygiene supplies is often a luxury.

"I'll tell you the best thing, truthfully, is when I get a call back from a child that I haven't seen in years and they tell me that they've received a scholarship or a parent who gets a job or when a parent gets a home," she said. "All of those kinds of things are the kinds of successes that I really aim for."

ENDOWMENT FUND NEWS

We are gaining on our \$25,000 minimum balance in the Endowment Fund to start making distributions from it. The Mid-South District LWML Board of Directors voted to transfer \$2,000 from the General Fund to the Endowment Fund, bringing the balance of the Endowment Fund to slightly over \$20,000. That leaves us less than \$5,000 to go to reach our minimum balance necessary to make distributions.

This wonderful opportunity was made possible because we were not able to hold our district convention in person. This saved money from the Mid-South District LWML budget because there were no board travel expenses to pay. The General Fund already had a good balance in it but with these savings from the district convention, the General Fund balance was even more robust. The Endowment Find Committee recommended the \$2,000 transfer to the board of directors who in turn approved it. Thank you to everyone who has had a part in bringing our Endowment Fund goal that much closer.
